

# NHS Reform Fortnightly Update

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## Retrospective report: 16<sup>th</sup> – 29<sup>th</sup> July

19 July On 19 July, the Governemnt <u>announced in a letter to GPs</u> that it will be <b>halting its GP data sharing scheme</b> , admitting to previous mistakes in the way the project has been run. It said that it will be dropping the previous tarket date (1 September) to launch significantly increased patient data collections by NHS Digital from GPs, and that the project would only go live once four conditions have been met. These four conditions are: 1) The ability to delete data already collected prior to a person choosing to opt out; 2) The backlog of existing opt outs being fully cleared; 3) The development of a "trusted research environment" — a repository into which the data will be collected and accessed only by NHSD-approved users without further extracting the data; and 4) Greater patient awareness of the scheme.
21 July Non 21 July, the Governemnt <u>announced</u> that NHS staff will be receiving a 3% pay rise, following heavy criticism of its previous recommendation for a 1 per cent increase. The announcement applies to hundreds of thousands of NHS staff, including nurses, consultants, non-clinical staff, paramedics and salaried GPs. It does not apply to junior doctors who are subject to a separate process, or partner GPs. Ministers said the offer meets the recommendations from pay review bodies. Several unions have released public statements which criticise the offer. Unison general secretary Christina McAnea said: "The government's acceptance of the NHS pay review body recommendation is an improvement on its earlier miserly 1 per cent proposal. But the increase falls short of what NHS staff deserve after the past 16 months. It's less than the wage rise given to Scottish health colleagues and not enough to protect the NHS."
On 22 July, <u>a statement by health minister Edward Argar</u> confirmed the <b>details of the key changes to the Integrated Care System (ICS) boundaries</b> . Only six ICS' will have their boundaries changed, to match the boundaries of their local authorities. Former Health Secretary had said previously that other ICS' were also expected to change to match upper-tier local council areas, but Sajid Javid had reversed this decision. NHS Providers chief executive Chris Hopson described the minister's decision as a "change of heart" but warned there remained a "risk to patient care" in those ICSs which must change. He said the boundary switch must be "co-designed and co-controlled by the trusts affected so they can do all they can to preserve the gains in integrated care that have been made over the last few years and minimise disruption to services".
28 July On 28 July, it was <u>announced that</u> Amanda Pritchard has been appointed as the new Chief Executive Officer of NHS England. Pritchard will be the first woman in the health service's history to hold the post, which she will take up on Sunday August 1. As NHS chief executive, she will be responsible for an annual budget of more than £130 billion while ensuring that everyone in the country receives high quality care. Elsewhere, it was announced on 27 July that Andrew New has been appointed as the CEO for NHS Supply Chain. He was chosen following an external, fair and open recruitment campaign and will join NHS Supply Chain from his current role at JCB, where he held the position of Group Executive Director, Purchasing and Supply Chain. Prior to that, he held senior procurement and supply chain roles for Magnox (a subsidiary of the NDA) and Babcock International Group.

### Lookahead: 29th July – 12th August (Parliament is in recess until September)

The Health and Care Bill was debated at second reading on Wednesday 14 July 2021 and has now been sent to a Public Bill Committee which will scrutinise the Bill line by line and is expected to report to the House by Tuesday 2 November 2021.
